Session Number**Goals****Commentaries****Wednesday 11th****1 Opening worship**

Prepared by the host Church.

(Commentary)

Check with Jean-Luc for how this service is to be organized. The place is decided by the EEAM. It will either be at Casablanca or Bouznikha.

Thursday 12th**3 House Groups**

Each day begins with a gathering in small groups of 8 to 10 people. These are the “House Groups”, similar to what was experienced in Athens during the Evangelisation Mission Conference. This time in the House Groups is for sharing and Bible reading, according to the Lectio divina model. Each delegate participates in one of these house groups. Each one can meditate God’s Word, pray, and find mutual support from the delegates in the same group through personal sharing, through telling of experiences and reflection.

(Commentary)

Felicity will be in charge of organizing these House Groups as well as identifying and preparing the group leaders.

4 Beginning the General Assembly

The President welcomes the delegates and designates the officers for the Assembly. He welcomes the moderators. When the moderators have been installed, he begins the Assembly:

- Election of 3 people in charge of helping the moderators make sure that the Assembly functions smoothly.
- Roll call of delegates.
- Approval of the minutes of the Strasbourg Assembly.
- Reading and receiving the minutes of the Council and officers’ meetings.
- Election and installation of the different Commissions.
- Welcoming invited representatives.

The President delivers his speech.

5 and 6 -- Report of Activities

The General Secretary briefly introduces the report of activities in order to underline the main points and objectives.

The moderators can then invite the Assembly to discuss the report, point by point. There could also be video or visual presentations describing various activities.

(Commentary)

The question of who will lead sessions 5 and 6 must yet be decided by the Council. In previous General Assemblies, the examination of the activities was done as a Forum. This form should be reused. Several working groups could be formed to examine themes that are brought out in the report of activities and then present them to the delegates in a list of reactions, remarks, etc.

7 Finances

This session on finances is just to present the financial results for 2004 and 2005.

(Commentary)

Philippe and Etienne will lead this session and will prepare the necessary video documents.

8 Evening worship service

It is led by the delegates in regional groups:

Thursday the 12th: Indian Ocean - Friday the 13th: Europe - Monday the 16th: western Africa - Tuesday the 17th: the Pacific and Latin America - Wednesday the 18th: central Africa.

(Commentary)

Friday the 13th

10 and 11 – Meeting our Neighbours, AIDS perspective

The work concerning AIDS has 3 parts:

- A time of testimony
- A time of Biblical study
- A time of work in small groups

(Commentary)

The testimonies concerning AIDS in Africa and in the Churches will be given by Gideon Byamugisha and Maguy Mfumu from Congo.

Charles Klagba, along with Felicity, will lead the time of Bible study: “I will lead the Bible study time by proposing a text from the book of Job: meeting someone in difficulty (rejection, discrimination, and stigmatization). The challenge is for our Churches to become communities of healing where there is no room for discrimination and stigmatization.”

The work done in the small groups or in workshops will be based on the testimonies and the Biblical studies. The goal is to see how the Cevaa Churches can adapt for themselves the work done through the EHAIA. We don't need to reinvent the wheel, but we can assume certain things. This study could lead to a charter describing some objectives for the Cevaa Churches in the area of AIDS.

11 Missionary Projects

(Commentary)

We are to provide a first progress report on the Missionary Programs and Projects after nearly 2 years of having them in place. The goal is to give an analysis of the missionary projects: What do they involve? What are their strong points? What are their deficiencies and silences? Etc. ...

Saturday the 14th and Sunday the 15th 14 Presentation of the EEAM

(Commentary)

The Evangelical Church of Morocco is given a time to present itself. This presentation will be very helpful since the delegates will then be leaving to meet the different parishes. The EEAM can present itself however it wishes.

15 Meeting the EEAM

(Commentary)

The delegates leave in groups of 8 to 10 to visit the different parishes of the EEAM for a time of sharing and discovery.

Monday the 16th

17 and 18 – Meeting our Neighbours, the Migrant perspective

The work concerning the neighbour as a migrant has 3 parts:

- A time of testimony
- A time of Biblical study
- A time of work in small groups

(Commentary)

This time of study concerning the neighbour as a migrant comes after the weekend spent in the parishes where the delegates will have been in the presence of migrants. The meetings of the weekend make up part of the testimonies. Other testimonies can be added during the session. See with Jean-Luc how to organize this testimony time.

Felicity will coordinate the Bible study time. Elisabetta and Jean-Luc could be in a group that would lead this time.

The time in a workshop should allow the delegates to examine a proposal for what could be some kind of shared action on the theme of migrants.

19 The future of the Cevaa

(Commentary)

The question of how we want the Cevaa to evolve is before us. About forty requests from diverse Churches are in the Cevaa office. What do we do with these requests? At the same time, the ecumenical landscape is changing. What should the specificity of the Cevaa be within the ecumenical constellation?

Tuesday the 17th

21 Meeting our Neighbours, perspective of the one with a different belief

The work concerning the neighbour as having a different belief includes:

- A time of testimony
- A time of Biblical study
- A time of work in small groups

(Commentary)

Being at Bouznika, the objective would be to listen to a Muslim believer and/or a representative of the inter-religious group. To be decided with Jean-Luc.

The Biblical study time could be led by Jean-Claude Basset or Zabulon Djarra. To be decided and coordinated with Felicity.

The time in the workshop will be oriented around the question of how to integrate dialogue and openness into our Church practices and missionary projects, without abandoning any part of our mission and witness.

23 Sharing Network

(Commentary)

The goal of this session is to examine the Sharing and Communication Network and to remobilize the Churches in the light of a network that uses modern communication tools.

Wednesday the 18th

25 Animation Pole: the network of trainers

(Commentary)

We wanted this Assembly to be built around the Animations Pole. The goal of this session is to mobilize the delegates for training, and especially theological training. To present the training project in providing the network of trainers with a new dynamic, with putting all the Centres into a network, etc...

26 Launching the Caravan for Peace

(Commentary)

Training for women. Launching the Caravan of Women for Peace. Finding the symbolical elements needed to launch this Caravan.

27 and 28 -- Decisions

(Commentary)

The final sessions are set aside for making decisions on all the dossiers that will have been presented during the Assembly, and especially: AIDS, the Migrant, Dialogue, the future of the Cevaa, Missionary Projects, Sharing Network, Theological training, etc...

Thursday the 19th

30 and 31 -- Decisions

(Commentary)

Continuing the decision-making process.

Decisions must also be made in the area of finances for the 2007 budget and orientations for 2008.
